SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

Rather like last week, the Eucharistic readings at 0930 are not the easiest today. In the Book of Job we find the introduction to a profound discussion about the question of human suffering, which is the main point of the book. It is set within a story of a good man who suffered and endured, and who is represented as wrestling with this basic problem of life. In the gospel we have Jesus having hard things to say about human relationships, but also talking gently and firmly about children. Both subjects have a contemporary ring. The sufferings of God's people in many parts of the world, and the apparent impotence of the international community in situations like Darfur, are daily before our eyes; Job's questions are asked in every age. Listening to the gospel reading we can recall that the Church of England has now changed its stance about the re-marriage of divorcees in church, and indeed there are all sorts of implications about this U-turn, but the fact of the matter is that the standard of what *ought* to be the case is still laid down firmly by Jesus in the gospel. As in all matters of moral theology, it is important to remember that whilst we may not succeed in what is required of us (which is in fact what underlies the pastoral thinking and re-thinking by the Church of England), that in itself is no reason for the actual standard to be simply abandoned. In that respect Jesus' words remain as the standard to be set, even if in personal life many fail to achieve it. W.R.H.

Our prayers today.
