THE FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING.

The Sunday next before Advent.

'Who is the King of Glory?' asks the psalmist twice in Psalm 24. The answer is 'The Lord, strong and mighty, the Lord mighty in battle.' The Old Testament picture is taken over into the Christ of God, who takes our humanity into his conquering glory. The King of Glory triumphed in the final conflict, in which death and life contended, and he won through triumphantly through loving sacrifice and resurrection life and power. The battle's celebration feast, to keep the imagery going, is in the eternal presence of the Father. Meanwhile, here on earth we praise the one who overcame the old order of sin and death, and made all things new in him. At the end of the liturgical year it is right to bask in a rare moment of spiritual euphoria, and to thank God for Jesus, who as Christ the King reigns in eternal glory in the glorified body of our human nature. Next week brings us very much back to earth. Advent takes us back to a world preparing, a world under judgement. There would have been no 'Christ the King' if there had not been a wondrous incarnation. Christmas has happened because this world needed it to happen. The restrained nature of our Advent worship in church is because it all focuses on the annual realisation that the world constantly stands in need of the Saviour. In earthly historical terms that need was met when Love came down at Christmas. When Christmas comes, Christians have pretty good cause for rejoicing, for we know why it all happened in the first place, and how the Babe of Bethlehem was to be Suffering Servant, Risen Saviour, Ascended Lord, and Christ the King.

After today shorter credal formulae will be used during these weeks immediately after the Gospel reading. Today Iain McKillop will introduce the course under the title:

Folders and Bundlers. It is once again the time for our annual Christmas paper blitz on the parish. This is now the only occasion in the year when we try to contact every home in the parish with information about what happens here at St Mary's.
