FOURTH SUNDAY IN ADVENT

CHRISTMAS EVE

Sponsor's Note. Remembering my grandson, Mark Nicholas Saunders, who would have been twenty-seven now. J.M.S.

It is not often that this Sunday is also Christmas Eve, but when it is we are in an odd state devotionally. In the morning it is not Christmas, no matter what is starting to hot up in the local hostelries and elsewhere, and we are not singing carols, but we know we are almost there. The Sunday Eucharist, in its rare rose décor hints that the dawn of Christmas is breaking now, and in a way this makes the Advent prayer 'Come, O Lord' even more insistent. The hymn 'O come, O come, Emmanuel' really belongs to this end of Advent rather than at the beginning, and the prayer is made in this versified form of the Advent Antiphons for the coming of the Lord, who is Wisdom, the Lord (Adonai), the Rod of Jesse, the Key of David, the eastern Morning Light, the King of the Nations, Emmanuel ('God with us'), born of the Blessed Virgin. We are singing it in full today. However, as soon as the Sung Eucharist is over we can start the fun: we decorate the church and festoon the tree, we eat mince pies and set up the crib. Yet the morning of the Fourth Sunday in Advent always has a flavour of its own, whether or not it is Christmas Eve; right up to the last moment we are reminded that the reason for the incarnation was and is the sober reality of a world constantly standing under the judgement of God, and of its desperate need of a Saviour. The Star of Bethlehem shines in the darkness to herald the sudden warmth of the Sun of Righteousness upon a world touched on Christmas Day by the power and mystery of God incarnate, amazingly revealed in the Child in the manger. As the American Bishop Phillips Brooks wrote in his famous carol,

'The dark night wakes, the dawning breaks, And Christmas comes once more.'

Our prayers today. We pray for our own church and parish, and in the worldwide Church we pray today in the Anglican Communion for the Church in Brazil. In the diocese we pray for the Lord Bishop himself, Bishop Christopher, in his pastoral and apostolic ministry. Within the parish we pray for the many who will be attending our Christmas services here, even though they are not members of the regular congregation, and also for the people who live in Hampton Grove.

The hymns are either from A Hundred Hymns for Ewell, or printed on the readings paper. We are using the whole of the hymn O come, O come Emmanuel at the Gradual today; it is a versified form of the Advent Antiphons, sung before the Magnificat at Evening Prayer at this time of year. Because it is long it will be sung in the Gradual slot and after the second reading as well. We shall sit throughout this hymn today; no need to stand when the servers move into position. All stand at the end for the announcement of the Holy Gospel.

Soldiers of Christ, arise,

Strong in the strength which God supplies
Through his eternal Son;

Who in the strength of Jesus trusts
Is more than conqueror.

From strength to strength go on,
Wrestle and fight and pray;

Welcome to any visitors or newcomers to St Mary's today. **Please make yourselves known**, and join us for coffee in church today after the 0930 Sung Eucharist.

'People, look east' and 'Sleigh Ride' really ought to drop more than a hint that we would like as many helpers as possible for this annual enacted parable of welcome for the Christ-child, as we prepare the church for Christmas. Because it is Christmas Eve this year Mattins will have been said earlier in the morning, because people will quite reasonably want to be home a bit earlier today than is usually the case when we do this. It is a natural and homely piece of enacted incarnational theology, and there is a basic informality to what we do, and it is meant to be a pleasant and happy time. Whilst there are specific things needing to be done, there is also the chance for people to go out into the churchyard and cut holly and other greenery, or generally take part in putting lights, tinsel and the like all around the church. There are also sacristy jobs of one sort or another, like changing the altar linen, filling cruets, and folding service-papers. No-one need feel that there is no job to do. Coffee is available, and there will be mince pies at some point. Everything can start more or less as soon as the Sung Eucharist is over. If anyone is still here at 1200 we shall finish with the Angelus.
