# SECOND SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY.

It is not often that sermons are quoted twenty-one years after they are delivered, but last week Mr Saunders reminded me of the splendid and memorable sermon preached by a former Reader, the late Ernest Bickley, on this Sunday way back in 1985. Ernie asked us to see in the story of the wedding at Cana – with a wonderful champagne-style illustration – the picture of Jesus bringing sparkle to life. Indeed, in this instance it was indeed a case of Jesus bringing life to a dead party. Here is Ernie's last paragraph, which concluded an excellent and well-crafted sermon:

'St John tells us, not of things that Jesus once did in Palestine, but of things that Jesus still does today throughout the whole world. What St John wants us to see is not that Jesus on a certain day turned some waterpots of water into wine, but that whenever Jesus comes into our lives there comes a new quality of life, which is really like turning water into wine. Without Jesus life is dull, and stale and flat; when Jesus comes into life, life becomes vivid and sparkling and exciting. Without Jesus life is drab and uninteresting; with Jesus life is thrilling and wonderful and exhilarating.'

**Our prayers today.** We pray for our church and parish, and in the worldwide fellowship of the Anglican Communion we pray today for the Provinces of Ontario and Rupert's Land in the Church of Canada. Within the Diocese of Guildford we pray for the ordinands who are now in training for the ordained ministry of the Church, and within the parish we pray for our Baptism Visitors – Kathie Burgess and Ruth Stockwell – and for the young children being baptized at Mattins this morning. In our systematic prayer for those who live in the geographical parish we pray today for those who live in The Headway.

Bible Reading Fellowship (BRF) Notes. With the renewal of subscriptions to the BRF occurring within the next few weeks, now is the opportunity for members of the congregation who do not currently receive BRF Notes to join the scheme. The BRF Notes offer four months of daily readings and comment, and they are an accessible way into the study of the Bible on our journey in the Christian faith. There are various 'levels' of study; some may prefer simpler Notes, others may prefer more demanding ones. The Notes are published three times a year, in January, May and September, at an annual cost of £10.50 They are immensely good value. There are specimen readings in the Welcome Area, near the south porch, and these may be borrowed by potential readers for, say, a week, before making the decision whether or not to join the BRF. A reminder about the annual **Hymnathon**, scheduled for Saturday, 10 February. There are two sessions: 1000-1300 and 1400 01600, but one decides upon one's own time commitment. It is great fun and quite a relaxed affair. The Hymnathon usually manages to raise through sponsorship quite a substantial amount towards the running expenses of the Village Fair in July. However, the 'substantial amount' - last year it was £422 - could be more substantial still, if more people took part. It is effortless and pleasant, and anyone who would like to take part is invited to sign up and pick up a sponsorship form today from the Welcome Area. Some people have been dissuaded in the past from taking part by a mischievous rumour that people would have to sing solos, and such is not the case. Carusos and corncrakes are equally welcome; so, for that matter, are choristers. We usually sing two verse from each hymn around the piano in the Parish Room. Refreshments will be served during each session. We are at present a good way through our second hymn-book, the red 'AMR' (Hymns Ancient and Modern, revised 1950; the book has been revised twice since then), so we shall be picking up at Hymn 251. Last Sunday was a delightful day in church. The Procession of the Three Kings was accomplished with due ceremony at the Sung Eucharist, but with the curious feature of Three (unrobed and uncrowned) Queens\* – a hastily arranged substitution because there were no Kings conveniently available from the Children's Hour. Of course this in no way complicated the simple symbolism of the Procession in which we united our offering of worship and treasure with that the Wise Men. It was good that a few people stayed on from the 0930 service and attended the Epiphany Festival of Nine Lessons at 1100, and I know they found this very worthwhile. 1100 in general. There is a section in this month's *Ewell Parish News* which lists all that is happening at the 11 o'clock slot on Sunday mornings this term. It is worth looking at, and even cutting out, because this term the later Sunday morning slot has a great deal to offer between now and Easter. Of the fourteen Sundays only three have the 'default' service of Choral Mattins pure and simple. Whilst I appreciate that most people are normally wedded to one particular service (nothing wrong in that), the fact remains that these other opportunities are there, and some of them are distinctive and unusual. Into this category one might put the all-age 'Candle Mass', the 'Valentine Mattins', and the two occasions when at a shorter than usual Choral Mattins there will be three Stations of the Cross with choral and organ music by *J S Bach*. Not many people do the rounds of the various services, though a few do, and so it is my hope that some who have already been to the Sung Eucharist may feel that, after a break for coffee, an occasional visit to an act of worship which is very different from the 0930 service may be a rewarding and enriching experience.
