THIRD SUNDAY BEFORE LENT.

SEPTUAGESIMA.

It said on last week's Notes that the weekly paragraph would be back today. Well, not quite. Instead, with the course of sermons on the Lord's Prayer beginning today, here are the two versions of the prayer in St Mathew and St Luke in *The Revised English Bible* translation. Also reproduced are the actual Greek texts, so as to show that even by sight (and without knowledge of the language) it is possible to see that there are significant differences in the original Greek itself. It might be useful to keep this page for further reference during the course.

THE TWO VERSIONS OF THE LORD'S PRAYER.

About half way through the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus says:

This is how you should pray: 'Our Father in heaven, may your name be hallowed; your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us the wrong we have done, as we have forgiven those who have wronged us. And do not put us to the test, but save us from the evil one.'St.Matt.6: 9-13

During the journey to Jerusalem:

At one place after Jesus had been praying, one of his disciples said, 'Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples.'

He answered, When you pray, say, 'Father, may your name be hallowed; your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. And forgive us our sins, for we too forgive all who have done us wrong. And do not put us to the test.' St Luke 11: 2-4.

We certainly hope to see some old friends at the 'Valentine Mattins' next Sunday morning. The service is open to everyone, of course, but the hope is that many who have been married here and who have heard about the service will just simply turn up. We already have a fair number of acceptances from those who have been specifically invited, i.e. those married here within the last three years. But the nature of the occasion is such that *any* married couple, or indeed any who are engaged to be married, or (for that matter) any who are 'sweethearts', ought to feel at home at this service. It will be Mattins 'slanted to the occasion.' The organ voluntary will be Mendelssohn's Wedding March, something not often heard on a Sunday morning at St Mary's, but not infrequently, of course, on a Saturday.

I gather that **Dr Patrick Miller's sermon** last Sunday could be classed as 'thought-provoking.' That is no bad thing. Dr Miller has kindly given me a copy of the script. It seemed to me to be a very sensitive handling of a far from straightforward issue, and one on which Christians have strong – and divided – views. I think the issue was spelt out very clearly, in that distinctive and balanced way that we have come to expect from Dr Miller, particularly in the Lenten discussion groups that he has led. By the same token it does not follow that, after setting out the different points of view, the preacher should not say where he actually stands on an issue. I understand there was some lively conversation afterwards, and that can only have been a good thing; St Paul's evangelistic preaching often got a mixed reception. We look forward to Dr Miller's Lent Course on *Life (and Death) Matters* with 'healthy anticipation'; details of this year's Course are in *Ewell Parish News*. W.R.H.
