FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

This Sunday sees a devotional gear-change, as we turn away from the penitential aspects of Lent and look instead towards the annual commemoration of the Passion of Christ. The Sunday before Palm Sunday has always had a note of invitation about it: a call to be with Christ in his passion, and to be with him on his path to glory, but which is also the Way of Sorrows. It is an invitation which comes with an RSVP attached to it, and our 'reply' is made one week later during Holy Week. The little signs are here today: the obviously more serious note to the readings and the hymns, the special service at 1100, the Passiontide veiling*, and the Stations of the Cross tonight. This Sunday used to be called 'Passion Sunday'; some years ago the Roman Catholics transferred this title to next Sunday (actually it makes more sense), and the old title for this Sunday has now been quietly dropped in the Church of England as well. However, Common Worship states that on this day 'Passiontide begins', and it is during this week that we should be making some personal decisions as to how we intend to spend this solemn time of the year. I have often said that the key to a Happy Easter is a well-kept Holy Week. There will as usual be quite a lot on at St Mary's, and I hope that St Mary's folk will use the time well. News items often show us great numbers of Muslims attending religious events on their holy days; all the great crowds at Mecca and that sort of thing. (They never manage to show us the thousands at the annual National Pilgrimage to Walsingham, however.) The Holy Week of the Christian Calendar ought to call us all out to be where we belong at this time: with Christ in Jerusalem and Ewell, both then and now, for it is all one and the same thing. He calls us to the Upper Room, to the Garden, to the foot of the Cross, and to the Resurrection joy. After all, he did it for us. So let us make our plans today for our own share in this, as we follow Jesus on the only possible path that would lead to (what Abelard called) 'the laughter of Easter Day.' W.R.H.

Stations of the Cross. Our Stations are meant to be used, and the last fortnight before Easter is perhaps the best of all times for this. Members of the congregation can always come into church through the office when it is open (Mon, Tues, Wed and Fri a.m.), and spend some quiet time at the Stations. Iain McKillop's poems which accompany the Stations are now also on the pillars beneath the Stations, and these may well be of help to those who are making their own Way of the Cross in church.

Ewell Parish News for April is available today, with full details of what is on in church during Holy Week and Easter. There will not be a Holy Week leaflet this year.

Although there are not all that many 'public appointments' to put in this week's Notes, the Vicar expects to be very busy this week, partly (though not entirely) due to the run-up to Holy Week. We have an understandable but unexpected crisis for the Village Fair. The important Bric-a-Brac stall, which always raises a lot of money, needs a new organizer (or organizers) this year. Next Sunday. *Holy Week* begins; it is Palm Sunday. Morning services at the usual times, with sermon at 0800 in the course entitled 'Christ Outpouring.' At 0930 there will be the simplified Palm Sunday rite, which we have now settled down to until such time as it may be practical to re-instate the outdoor procession. This is also another Sunday when there is something distinctive at 1100. There will be the second of two services of Choral Mattins, incorporating certain Stations of the Cross and with related choral and organ music by J S Bach. There are some copies of the service leaflet available in the Welcome Area after the 0930 service today for the benefit of anyone who would like a

preview. There will be three short conducted meditations (and no sermon) on the three Stations. I have been glad to see several people staying on for a second service in recent weeks, when there has been something special on at 1100, and I hope next week's service will be seen as one very special Lenten feature this year.
