'Our prayers today'. This regular Sunday feature normally includes a mention of another part of the worldwide Church. This is to keep us constantly in mind of the fact that although the fullness of the universal Church is localized in every Christian congregation, the global – indeed cosmic – dimension of the Church is the wider reality. For most of the year we remember a part of our own Anglican Communion, which certainly needs all the prayers it can get at the moment, since it is going through some pretty hard times, but when the number of provinces is used up (we go through the list alphabetically, and finished last week) we go on to pray for other parts of the Church. We begin today with our fellow-Christians in the Roman Catholic Church (the biggest by far, probably just about over the total number of all the others combined), and next week it will be the turn of the Holy Orthodox Churches of the east. There are quite of lot of main-line Churches to cover. It will take us until the Anglican cycle resumes in Advent.

Next Sunday. This is the actual Sunday of the Patronal Festival, and this year (after a year's gap) we shall have the attractive Procession of Our Lady at the end of the Sung Eucharist. There will be Choral Mattins at 1100, with a short Station at the Statue of Our Lady at the end of the service. In the evening there will be Choral Evensong at 1830, and this will be the annual Old Choristers' Reunion.

## SUNDAY OF THE DEDICATION FESTIVAL



### PATRONAL FESTIVAL BEGINS

The Sunday of the Dedication Festival is normally kept here as either the first or second Sunday of the Patronal Festival week. This year it is the first, and in our worship there is a clear concentration on the 'living stones', those who make up the Christian presence here. At the Sung Eucharist there will be the Renewal of Baptismal Vows after the Gospel, followed by the 'Procession of the Parish Church', a new feature which was first introduced two years year. This is an opportunity to reflect upon the multi-faceted role of our parish church, at least as far as its nurture of God's people is concerned, and it doubles-up as the sermon. Processions are not meant to be aimless meanderings around the church; as a general rule they are meant to illustrate, or point to, some aspect of the Christian Faith, or else serve as an out-of-door act of witness or devotion or a combination of both (as with outdoor Stations of the Cross), or traditionally to mark the note of high festival at the Eucharistic entrance on greater holy days. Today's procession is of the same genre, concentrating on what the particular parts of our church actually stand for, or what they proclaim, as we recall with thanksgiving all that 'St Mary's Ewell' has meant over very many centuries to those for whom it has been their parish church. In theory, because it is a Procession, we should all be standing up throughout this section of the service (and again in theory all should be walking around), but not everyone will find that amount of standing easy. Those who find the standing tedious should feel free to sit after the opening section of the hymn, and to stand again for the last three verses. By the same token, anyone who wants to follow around should just tag on behind the singers. Please do not feel embarrassed about doing that, if you wish to do so.

Our prayers today. We pray for our church and parish, giving thanks in particular for the 159 years of 'new' St Mary's. In our prayer for the world-wide Church we pray today for the Christians who belong to the Roman Catholic Church (see note below), and in the Diocese for the staff of the Department for Social Responsibility. In the parish we pray for the Estates Committee, responsible for our buildings, and for the people who live in Mintwater Close.

Welcome to any visitors or newcomers to St Mary's today. Please make yourselves known, and join us for coffee in the church hall across the road between the 0930 and 1100 services.
