SIXTH SUNDAY IN LENT

PALM SUNDAY

At the beginning of Holy Week I simply write to repeat the annual reminder that the key to a truly happy Easter is a well-kept Holy Week. Many members of the congregation here derive much from the liturgy during Holy Week and Easter, but (to my certain knowledge) there are also some for whom the distinctive services in the latter part of Holy Week are still, as yet, a closed book. This week we travel along Christ's Way of Sorrows, which most wonderfully turns out to be the path to glory, both for Christ and also for those who in baptismal reality share in his risen life. The worship of the Church has so much to offer the people of God during the Great Week, and it is my hope and prayer that St Mary's people will avail themselves of as much of it as possible, especially at the principal occasions on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. This year, very much by exception, 'our' Easter Vigil will be at the Cathedral, not at St Mary's, partly because we have candidates for baptism and confirmation. It is worth remembering that from Maundy Thursday evening to Easter itself ('The Easter Triduum') it is all really 'one experience,' and, very significantly, there is no Dismissal either at the end of the Maundy Thursday Eucharist or at the end of the Good Friday rite. It is all one Paschal experience, into which we Christians are caught up annually, as we relive the historical events, and wait once more for the risen Christ to proclaim his own resurrection life, in which we already have a share through our baptism. 1800 Evening Prayer

In church during Holy Week and Easter.

Full details of the arrangements for Holy Week and Easter are given in *Ewell Parish News* for April, which all regular members of the congregation should already have. The centre-page spread lists everything, together with several notes about the services. A very basic summary is given below.

Summary of Holy Week and Easter arrangements:

Monday: 1830 Holy Communion. Tuesday: 1000 Holy Communion;

Wednesday: 1140 The Litany 1200 Holy Communion.

Maundy Thursday: 2000 Sung Eucharist of the Lord's Supper, followed by the Watch of the Passion until Midnight. Good Friday: 1115 Children's Stations of the Cross; 1200 The Preaching of the Passion (the service lasts one hour); 1900 The Good Friday Liturgy (Ante-Communion, Veneration of the Cross and Holy Communion). Holy Saturday: 0900 Ante-Communion of the Burial of Our Lord. Easter services: 2000 (Holy Saturday night) At the Cathedral (see below): the Easter Vigil and Mass of the Resurrection; Sunday morning at St Mary's: 0700 The Service of Light; 0800 Holy Communion; 0930 Procession, Blessing of the Easter Garden, and Sung Eucharist with

Renewal of Baptismal Vows; 1100 Choral Mattins; 1210 Holy Communion; 1800 Evening Prayer at the Easter Garden.

Additional announcements for Palm Sunday 2008

A few points about the Holy Week and Easter services this year:

- 1. Palm crosses. We have not provided palm crosses on Palm Sunday at St Mary's for the last few years, after finding that very few palms were in fact collected, and all the rest were wasted. No-one has actually complained about their subsequent absence. However we have continued to use the big ones for the Procession. In any case, as I have frequently pointed out, it is actually the *carrying* of palms and other branches, rather than *receiving* a palm cross, which is the principal purpose of the palms of Palm Sunday, and the Procession of Palms will take place as usual at the beginning of the Sung Eucharist. *However*, this year we have a certain number of palm crosses left over from the Women's World Day of Prayer Service, and these are available today for those who want them. W.R.H.
- 2. The Watch of the Passion. The chart for this annual act of devotion on Maundy Thursday night is in position today. I hope it will be initialled (or ticked) by many people *today*. This is an opportunity for *silent prayer with one another*, as together we kneel before, and in communion with, the Christ of Gethsemane. After a couple of years of not being well observed, the attendance at the Watch has been much better in the last year or two. If anyone is a bit unsure of what to do during the Watch, please have a word with me. However, guidelines and books are always available on the night. Whilst there is always a decent number at the start of the Watch, it invariably tails off later on; that is why the chart is important, even though there are always some who come towards the end. Please think about this today, and sign up if you can. The Lord said to his disciples then, and still says it now, 'Could you not watch with me one hour?' Or even half? W.R.H.
- **3.** Our arrangements for **Good Friday** were changed two years ago, and it seemed a successful thing to do. These arrangements are being repeated this year. **Children's Stations of the Cross** will take place as usual at 1115. The service at 1200 will last for no more than one hour, and will be a service of the **Preaching of the Passion**, and this year it will be based on some of our Stations of the Cross. The choir will not be at this service. **The Good Friday Liturgy** will take place in the evening at **1900**, and again this should only last for just about one hour. The choir will be singing at this service.
- **4.** The Easter Vigil. The theological and devotional points which I have emphasised over the years about this particular rite put it in a class of its own. Those who come to it year by year will testify to its power, as the rite moves from darkness to light, and from death to life. It is the Christian Passover: Christ re-born in the waters of death, and the baptized Christian taken into the Christ-experience. Mainly (though not entirely) because this year we have candidates for baptism and confirmation, we shall not be celebrating the Vigil at St Mary's, and 'our Vigil' will be *at the Cathedral*, where the service starts at 2000 on Holy Saturday evening. Anyone may attend this service. The feature of the Blessing of the Water (which occurs at the Easter Vigil) will take place this year at St Mary's at the Sung Eucharist on Easter Morning, together with the Renewal of Baptismal Vows, and the formal 'return' of the Alleluya. Next year, the Easter Vigil should take place here as normal. W.R.H.
