EASTER DAY.

THE DAY OF RESURRECTION.

A very happy Easter to all at St Mary's today.

Our prayers today. We pray for our own church and parish, giving thanks for the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, and for the new life which we share in him. In the worldwide Anglican Communion we pray appropriately today for the Church in the Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East. In our own Diocese we pray for Christopher, our Bishop, and for his work as the chief pastor of God's people in Surrey. In our parish prayer we pray for our fellow-Christians in the other Ewell churches, united with us today in praise of Christ's resurrection. In our systematic prayer for the parish itself we pray today for the people of Windmill Avenue.

SERVICES TODAY

0715 THE SERVICE OF LIGHT.

Because the Easter Vigil this year did not take place at St Mary's, but at the Cathedral where Confirmation candidates from this parish were among those being confirmed, the Easter Candle is being blessed early on Easter morning, before being set up at the Easter Garden. Some other features of the Easter Vigil rite will be incorporated into the 0930 Sung Eucharist. Next year the arrangements should be back to normal.

1100 CHORAL MATTINS

Note. For the benefit of any visitors to St Mary's today it is perhaps worth explaining that Mattins at St Mary's is generally 'choral service' (as today), with a large part of the service sung by the choir. However, the congregation is invited to join in all the other parts of the service: the hymns, the Easter Anthems, and, of course, the spoken parts of the service. The sermon, unusually, comes at the beginning of the service, and when the sermon has ended there is organ music until it is time for the Introit to be sung. Today the Introit is being sung from the back of the church. The congregation should stand when the organ music finishes.
