THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER.

(Easter 2)

There are several adjustments to our normal routine at the Sung Eucharist beginning today. Most of them are of a minor nature, but all are geared to making the service much more streamlined. Lately the service has been getting longer, and it has got to the point where something must really be done about it. Those concerned more directly with these matters should have received (or else will receive) a memorandum from me about all this. Today is the first 'normal' Sunday for quite some time: the long readings and additional features of Lent and Holy Week are now past, and this is the obvious time to try and sort this problem out. It is not a straightforward matter: in terms of 'optional extras', such as are envisaged in Common Worship, we use almost none of them, and we have pruned the service to its absolute minimum in terms of the actual 'items' in the service. The only optional feature still left in is the opening prayer, and my guess is that its removal would not be welcomed. If some of the adjustments don't work, we can look at things again; however, it is clear that something has to be done, and we are making a start today. Streamlining is not a synonym for rushing, and I hope that the service will continue to presented and performed with reverence and dignity. In fact this streamlining is particularly important today, because the incoming congregation for the 1100 service will be very large (certainly over 200), and it is very important that there is a decent gap between the services. The last time this happened I asked during the notices for all the 0930 congregation to leave via the south porch; but everyone forgot, and the confusion was immense and unedifying. I make the request again today, and I shall repeat it before the Blessing. Books may be left on the table by the south porch. W.R.H.

Intercession; then all stand for the Greeting of Peace.

After the exchange of the Peace, all sit for the Offertory Anthem:

Anthem: Greater love hath no man.

John Ireland (20th cent.)

The words of this magnificent anthem speak of the unity of the Cross and Resurrection as unfolded in the Paschal mystery, and then describe the reality and implications of our risen life in Christ. The words are from various scriptural sources, beginning with the Song of Songs, but mainly from 1 St Peter.

Many waters cannot quench love, neither can the floods drown it. Love is strong as death. Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. Who, his own self, bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we being dead to sin should live unto righteousness. Ye are washed, ye are sanctified, ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus; ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, that ye should show forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvellous light. I beseech you, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service.

Then *all stand* for Eucharistic Prayer **E**; Easter Preface on page 316. The Lord's Prayer, etc. back on page 178. After the Invitation to Communion: *Agnus Dei* (Lamb of God).

Note: As from today, the congregation should start to approach the altar as soon as the words of Invitation have been said, though the gates will not be closed until the celebrant has left for the side chapel. The choir will receive the Holy Communion after the other members of the congregation. During Communion the chancel should be left clear, while the choir is singing; people should watch their opportunity for going through. (These arrangements are, at the moment, experimental.)

During the Communion: Hymn 278 [Choir use OEH 162, verse 8, *Deirdre*.]

All stand after 'Let us pray' for the Post-Communion prayer: page 401 The Mutual Salutation, Easter Blessing and Dismissal.

Hymn: Finished the strife. [Tune: *Surrexit*, MHT 122]

Finished the strife of battle now, Gloriously crowned the victor's brow: Sing with gladness, hence with sadness: Alleluya, alleluya.

After the death that him befell, Jesus Christ has harrowed hell: Songs of praising we are raising: Alleluya, alleluya.

On the third morning he arose, Shining with victory o'er his foes; Earth is singing, heaven is ringing: Alleluya, alleluya.

Lord, by your wounds on you we call: Now that from death you've freed us all: May our living be thanksgiving: Alleluya, alleluya.

Advance notice of the **Annual Parochial Church Meeting**, which takes place on Sunday 27 April just after 1100, by generosity of the Mattins congregation, who give up their slot on this annual occasion. It is an important APCM this year, forming part of the run-up to an interregnum in the parish. There will be several vacancies on the Parochial Church Council, and some people may well wish to be involved in the consultative process, which will occur in the coming months. We have been plugging this lately, mainly for the benefit of those who should have signed up last year, but didn't. The Roll will be soon be frozen until after the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on 27 April, so please check to see if you are really on the Roll, and if necessary fill in an ER form.
