SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

There is information on posters and in *Ewell Parish News* about the event in connexion with *Hope* 2008, which is taking place in the grounds of Bourne Hall this afternoon. It seems that there is scarcely a moment today when there isn't something or other actually happening somewhere, and to which the Christians of St Mary's may possibly wish to go; and obviously not everyone will either want, or be in a position, to go to everything. However, the afternoon event is a good piece of Christian window-dressing, and a salutary reminder that 'churches together' is meant to indicate something more than just an association of people with ecumenical interests. Here is a case of 'Churches Together' actually pulling together. The afternoon event will scarcely be over before it is time for *Choral Evensong* here, with its Recital afterwards. It will be good to welcome Jonathan Holmes' remarkable Chapel Choir from Emanuel School, and the music both for the service and for the recital looks very thrilling. It really is quite a day.

The Soirée Musicale of choral, instrumental, and organ music on Saturday by Jeremy Cole and our own Parish Choir (see further on in the Notes) deserves the support of members of the congregation for fairly obvious reasons. They have not given a concert as such for a very long time, not least because of the sheer amount of work they do for the liturgical services. Years ago, when they were normally only allowed to sing the anthem at the Sunday services, they used to give at least two concerts a year - I suppose by way of compensation. The nearest thing we have to this is the Reading and Music of the Passion at the start of Holy Week. Saturday's concert will reveal the considerable musical ability and versatility of our singers, some of whom are also quite skilled instrumentalists: Elizabeth Humphries plays the oboe with the National Children's Orchestra. We can look forward to a varied and interesting programme on Saturday, and I hope it will be well supported. It doesn't come for free, because, firstly, just like any other recital or concert at St Mary's, the proceeds go towards the maintenance of the organ, and secondly, we should not think that because they are our own musicians we shouldn't have to pay to listen to them. However, the evening will be cheap at the price, and it is worth remembering that it is only £5 (not £6) if the tickets are bought in advance. They are available today after the services. As usual, there will be interval refreshments. It promises to be a delightful evening. This is an event which is perhaps rather more 'in house' than is the case with, say, a recital by a visiting organist. In that sense it is more specifically aimed at members of the regular congregation, so I hope it will be well supported. W.R.H.

1700 CHORAL EVENSONG

Book of Common Prayer rite

This is the third service in the series of five Choral Evensongs for summer Sunday evenings. There will be tea in church from 1615, and normally the chance to listen to the choir rehearsing before the service, though it is possible that today the choir may have a different timetable. There are special readings for these services from the Book of Tobit and the Letter of St James. There will not be a sermon. Today the service is sung by the Choir of Emanuel School, Clapham, and they will be giving a *recital* afterwards. Details of the Recital are listed after the running-order of the service. There is a retiring collection.
