EIGHTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

(It is also 'Sea Sunday'.)

The decision of the General Synod of the Church of England to admit women priests to the episcopate will be welcomed by very many, and also regretted by quite a significant number. It is not quite clear what the proposed safeguards for the minority constituency actually are. The Synod seemed content to make only minimal provision in this respect, far less (in fact) than was advocated by the two archbishops. We shall see what happens in due course, when the matter comes before the Synod next February, but the fact remains that 'codes of practice' do not have the force of law, and the future looks uncertain for those who were hoping for a more accommodating outcome. The decision is of no immediate and direct concern to the people of St Mary's, not least because the first such consecrations will certainly not take place during the remainder of my time here. It will, of course, have clear personal implications in due course for myself, as most people realise, and I shall have to consider such things at some time in the future, but I shall be out of office by that time. Meanwhile, as far as St Mary's is concerned, everything carries on as normal.

The Village Fair will be with us once again on Saturday, and I have little doubt that we shall all have a marvellous time once again. I am so grateful to all those who do so much at the Fair; many have clocked up years and years of faithful and devoted service on the stalls or in the kitchens and in a host of other ways. The Fair is always a splendid occasion, and it is much envied by surrounding parishes. Ian and Kathie Burgess have done an extra year as organizers of the Fair (it is normally a three-year stint), and they have put their own distinctive stamp on it. However, we have all known for some time that this is their last one, and at the moment we have to come to terms with the fact that unless someone (usually, but not necessarily, a husband and wife team) surfaces to take it on, then this will really be the last Ewell Village Fair. An article in *Ewell Parish News* has already made this plain. So far no-one has evinced any interest in taking the job on. The implications are serious: the loss of up to £10,000 in revenue, when we are already running at a £20,000 a year deficit is serious enough, but it is even more serious when such a crisis occurs just before the parish becomes vacant. A priest who may be interested in coming here may well demur on hearing such tidings, and in the process of finding a new parish priest such things are bound to come out into the open. Please give some serious thought to this matter, before it is too late. W.R.H.

St Mary's once again presents THE EWELL VILLAGE FAIR in the grounds of Ewell Castle School. The most recent handbill about this is being given out again with the Notes today for the benefit of those who haven't already seen it, and also for our many visitors at the 1100 service.

Goodies for the Fair. There is only a limited amount of space available in the Welcome Area, because we need rather more room than usual today at the 1100 service, so that parents and godparents can have sufficient space. Please do not put anything outside the obviously designated area, but if it fills up, please put other items, firstly, under the older trestle-table just by the south porch, and then, secondly, on the (unoccupied) seats in the south aisle. At least that will keep things in more or less the same general area.

The words of the anthem at the Sung Eucharist will in future be printed out on the Weekly Notes (unless they are very brief) and not printed on the leaflet containing the rest of the service. It is still the aim to keep the text of the Sung Eucharist on one folded sheet of A4, and this cannot be done when the anthem is 'wordy rather than repetitive.' Today's vigorous anthem by *Sumsion* for 'Sea Sunday' is a case in point. Since everyone will have the Weekly Notes anyway, it is not exactly an inconvenience.

The ashes of the late **Olive Freeman** will be interred in the Garden of Remembrance on Wednesday at 1100. Anyone who would like to come would be very welcome.

Coffee Morning coach outings. A reminder that there are **two** further coach outings this year. They are on Thursday 11 September to **Chichester and Bosham**, and on Friday, 28 November to **Portsmouth** for the *Victorian Festival of Christmas*. There is further information about this in the current *Ewell Parish News*. J.B.

Christmas at St Mary's (sic). It may seem a bit premature to mention this, since Christmas is almost six months away, but plans have to be made well in advance here, because of our varied programme of regular and special services. I am thinking of laying on a fairly traditional Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols at 1700 on either Sunday 21 December (or, possibly, though less likely) 14 December, possibly with some 'seasonal refreshments' afterwards. However, a considerable amount of work is needed to produce this, including – naturally – what the choir is likely to be called upon to do, so I do not think it right to proceed, unless I am clear that there is a reasonable amount of support. A paper is available at the back of the church (somewhere) for people to sign: the sentence runs, 'I would wish to attend a Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols in December, if one is laid on.' Please sign up, if you are keen; I think I am looking for a minimum of about 35-40 names, otherwise it won't happen. W.R.H.

Today's Post-Communion Prayer is a modern version of what is perhaps better known to us as the hymn 'Strengthen for service, Lord, the hands that holy things have taken.' We sing the hymn quite often. In its English form in *Common Worship* it is the work of the present Bishop of Gloucester, but the prayer itself is very old, and comes from the ancient East Syrian (or Persian) rite, known as the *Liturgy of Addai and Mari*. In its original form it was said by the Deacon during the people's communion, and it makes a very good post-Communion prayer or hymn.
