# NINTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

The Notes are, of course, normally compiled early in the previous week, so it is not possible to say anything about the Ewell Village Fair held yesterday. However, the result will be announced in church this morning. Our grateful thanks go to all who have worked so hard to make the Fair a success.

The scriptures at 0800 and 0930 move on from the Sower and his seed to the parable of the 'tares' ('weeds' or 'darnel' they say now) among the wheat. Some of the parables are almost blindingly obvious; this one certainly is, though the disciples seemed pretty obtuse on this occasion, and had to ask for it to be spelled out for them. If it had been the 11 o'clock parable then we might have had some sympathy for them, because this is one which generally causes trouble. It is the parable of the Unjust Steward, which - perhaps significantly - only falls in the other lectionary scheme once every three years, and then on a Sunday when it is likely to be displaced by something else. The celebrated crux is the question, 'Who commended the unjust steward?' Was it the lord of the steward (his master), or the Lord (note the capital) Jesus? The problem is that the word is the same in the Greek, and our earliest reliable texts are what are known as uncials: they are written entirely in capital letters. So it is a problem of interpretation: hermeneutics or exegesis are the posh words used by scholars to describe this quest for a right understanding of the text. It is finely balanced, but the odds are that it probably was the Lord, not the lord, not least because one fairly reliable principle of New Testament study is that 'the harder reading is generally to be preferred', and for the simple reason that the early Church would scarcely have invented something which was going to cause difficulty to itself. I shall say something about this in the sermon at 1100 today. It comes at the start of the service, if anyone is curious enough to stay on after coffee to hear it! W.R.H.

The experimental 0930 leaflet. There has been no feed-back at all over this, which is slightly surprising; but then, if no-one complains, one must assume that it is working all right. After next week we shall revert to 'everything being on the (rather skimpy) Notes' for the three Sundays of somewhat basic liturgy at the beginning of August, and the leaflet will appear again when the Sunday arrangements get back to normal on 24 August. The Vicar would be glad to hear of any comments about the 0930 leaflet, for good or for ill, because at the end of the day we want to make things easier for worshippers at the Sung Eucharist. In any case, the fact remains that the black books are now starting to fall apart, and it will be more convenient for their use to be confined to the early service, where there is not so much variable material in the course of the rite.

**Church Hall notice-boards.** This notice appeared some time ago, but does not seem to have been heeded very much by those concerned. Some of these internal notice-boards are now very untidy, and it would be good if they could be tidied up (before I do it myself), since untidy notice-boards are not exactly a good piece of window dressing, particularly to those who hire the hall. Whilst it is clear that most have read this slip, it is also clear that there are some who haven't.

**Paul Hill and Caroline Holmes**, both of whom were confirmed at the Cathedral at the Easter Vigil, will be married at St Mary's on Saturday at 1400. No doubt some of the 0930 congregation would like to be there to wish them well on the great day. It will be a Nuptial Eucharist according to the *traditional* rite – something a bit unusual these days.

**Coach outing to Chichester and Bosham on Thursday, 11 September.** We are now taking bookings for this excursion. The coach will leave at 0915 (for 0930 – but starting to board from 0915 and leaving no later than 0930) for Chichester, where there will be the opportunity to visit the Cathedral, look around the shops and have some lunch. Afterwards we shall continue to the picturesque village of Bosham and the quay, where there is a delightful Saxon church\* next to the millstream, and where Canute's daughter is supposed to be buried. We shall return home a little later than usual, leaving Bosham about 1700-1715. Seats still cost just £10 each, and to secure yours please give names (and money) to Joan Boulden or to Lynne Yuille.
