ST MATTHEW, Apostle and Evangelist.

'STEWARDSHIP SUNDAY.'

This is probably one of the most suitable days in the year on which to keep a local 'Stewardship Sunday,' since St Matthew was a tax collector before he discovered the 'true riches' in Jesus. So since this year the feast of St Matthew makes a rare landing on a Sunday, it seems appropriate that the 'moveable feast' of the annual Stewardship Sunday should be held on this particular day. It is apparently the case (though I have never actually personally checked this out) that, apart from the preaching of the Kingdom as such, the most frequently spoken about subject by Jesus seems to have been money. I am immensely grateful to those who look after our finances here. I am aware of the all time and effort which is put in by the members of our Finance Committee, and I can confidently say that our finances are most carefully monitored. Nevertheless we continue to run at a sizeable annual deficit, and, quite apart from anything else, it should be fairly plain that our utility bills alone are going to rise very substantially in the immediate future. The annual reminder of our responsibilities as stewards of the household of God does not happen on the same Sunday each year, and this will be the last Stewardship Sunday at which I shall be present. It gives me the opportunity to say a warm word of personal thanks as you Parish Priest to all those who have given so generously over the years, and in many instances very sacrificially, and all out of love for God and his Church, in order to maintain the worship and pastoral ministry of this parish church. Church cleaning.
