# TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

Holy Baptism at the Sung Eucharist today is always a good opportunity for people to reflect upon their own stage in their Christian pilgrimage. Joyful occasion though it is, the rite of Holy Baptism has a way of calling us back to first principles: about believing and trusting in God who loves, creates and saves, about following in the steps of Our Lord Jesus Christ and through grace 'being made like unto him', and about taking seriously that business of love of God and love of neighbour. Although as a congregation we formally renew our baptismal vows twice a year, every baptismal occasion cannot but help reminding us that we all have to find time to look after our own souls, for our own 'Pilgrim's Progress' is never a straightforward business.

The words 'Pilgrim's Progress' can also draw attention to one distinctive feature of our worship at St Mary's today, which is a noticeable amount of music by Ralph Vaughan Williams. (The 'Pilgrim's Progress' connexion is that the choir will be singing Vaughan Williams' Mr Valiant for Truth on Remembrance Sunday.) He died fifty years ago in 1958. I well remember the highly-charged atmosphere in the Royal Albert Hall, when his Fantasia on a theme of Thomas Tallis was played as the first item – and with no applause – at the last-but-one night of the Proms, just after he died. Today is his birthday. This musical gesture is appropriate, not just because he lived in Surrey, but because he exercised a major influence for good upon Church music in general and upon Church of England music in particular. To him we owe the musical side of the original English Hymnal of 1906, something which in itself brought about a new standard of music which was at once scholarly and yet immensely singable. His preface to the original edition is still worth reading, not least for such gems as commending to choirs the business of learning Bach chorales, rather than 'vulgar anthems by indifferent composers.' His researches into English folk music bore fruit in the music of the Church, and many well-known hymn tunes, like those to He who would valiant be and O little town of Bethlehem, come from such sources. Also in the realm of hymnody we have some masterpieces from his own pen, such as his tune to For all the saints, which has effectively displaced all others, and the one to Come down, O love divine, which even the very fine tune by 'our' Sir William Harris in Ancient and Modern Revised totally failed to dislodge from its pre-eminence. Today we have two of his anthems, and two organ voluntaries based on Welsh hymn-tunes. In the one case we shall also sing the melody upon which the organ prelude is based. He was a great and versatile musician, yet somehow quintessentially English in style and flavour, a composer who is once again being treated as a significant figure, after having suffered (like many other composers) a period in the musical doldrums after his death. In church we certainly owe much to at least one aspect of the musical genius of this great Englishman. W.R.H.

The eastern Orthodox Churches are a group of independent ('autocephalous') Churches, who accord a primacy of honour to the Patriarch of Constantinople. In this country, perhaps surprisingly, the Orthodox communities together form the fourth largest Christian grouping.

It is the occasion of the annual priests' pilgrimage retreat for The Federation of Catholic Priests. He will, of course, be remembering the parish at the Shrine.

**Children's Society Christmas Cards** will be on sale in church next Sunday. Many members of the congregation have bought these cards over the years. The cards are usually of high quality, and this is a good way of helping the Society and its work.

A reminder about the **Inset to St Mary's Guide-Book.** Most members of the congregation will know that we have an excellent guide-book to St Mary's, written at the time of the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the present church by Eve Myatt-Price. Since the book was written, there have been two major additions to the church: the **Millenium-Jubilee Window** and the **Stations of the Cross and Resurrection**. A leaflet has now been issued to supplement the information in the guide-book, and this will be inserted in the unsold copies of the book. Those who already have the guide-book may collect a copy of the leaflet from the office, if they wish; there is a pile on the right-hand side of the window-sill.

**The church website** has a *No to Halloween* poster available for the congregation to put on front doors, if desired. There will probably be a few printed off for the back of church as well, but the website one can be down-loaded by those who have the facility for doing so.

**The Organ Pipe**. This has been placed conspicuously against one of the pillars which supports the west gallery. There is also a leaflet about our very fine organ, describing the instrument, and stressing the need for it to be kept in good repair.

**Psalm 118.** A text from this psalm was once famously quoted by Queen Elizabeth I. The same text was also quoted by Jesus, and this came up in the gospel reading last week. Members of two of the congregations last week were encouraged to read this psalm as homework, and I hope that those concerned did so. (If you forgot, do try again this week.) It is a strange and wonderful psalm, and was almost certainly 'the hymn' which was sung on Maundy Thursday night before Jesus and his disciples went out to the Mount of Olives. W.R.H.

**Next Sunday.** The services are at their usual times. There will be the rite of anointing at the Sung Eucharist, this being the Sunday nearest to St Luke's Day. Also at 0930 there will be a short commemoration of the late Alfred Goodey. The monthly Book of Common Prayer Sung Eucharist will be at 1100.
